City of Poway Photo Enforcement Program Overview

The City of Poway launched its Photo Enforcement Program on March 17, 2005 with one monitored approach. Four more were added March 29, 2005 for a total of five approaches.

The primary goal of the program is to improve traffic safety through the reduction of red light violations and associated collisions, and to reduce incidents of related inattentive driving.

While the primary goal of photo enforcement is to improve public safety and decrease serious intersection related collisions, the revenue derived from the program can be used for equipment or other traffic related expenses such as education and additional enforcement. A side benefit is that the cameras allow police officers to make better use of their patrol time because they are not required to monitor intersections as frequently or for extended periods. The following charts show key components of your Red Light Camera program, including the number of citations issued to non-residents vs. Poway residents.



Total Number of Incidents vs. Citations Issued to Residents vs. Non-Residents


Of the total 50,938 citations issued since inception of the program, only 2,784 went to Poway residents. Less than 6% of residents received citations, while more than 94% went to non-Poway households.





Red Light Photo Enforcement Program

Background:

Recently, the City of San Diego ended their Red Light Photo Enforcement Program. Other cities in the State have ended their programs as well and still others are considering it. Now is a good time for the City Council to evaluate the Red Light Photo **Enforcement Program in Poway.**

Poway's Red Light Photo Enforcement Program has been in operation since 2005. The goal of the program is to improve safety at key intersections within the City. The program is administered by a private company, Redflex Traffic Systems, Inc. (Redflex). The most recent agreement was approved on March 17, 2010, for a five year period with an option to extend for two, two-year periods. A copy of the agreement is provided as Attachment 1. Redflex provides the equipment, maintains the equipment, monitors operations, and provides training and support to City staff and the Sheriff's Department.

Poway has cameras installed at three intersections that cover a total of five approaches as follows:

• Ted Williams Parkway & Pomerado Road – two approaches southbound and EB1 eastbound

• Poway Road & Pomerado Road – two approaches eastbound and westbound

Safety:

Generally, safety is improving at the intersections with red light photo enforcement. In the seven years prior to the implementation of the program, the total number of broadside accidents for all three intersections was 62 (or 8.9 per year). In the seven years after implementation there were 29 broadside accidents (or 4.1 per year). That is a 53% reduction in this most severe type of accident. However, the less severe rear end accidents at these intersections have actually increased by 8%. This is common at intersections with red light photo enforcement as drivers become more aware of the cameras and tend to brake suddenly. In the seven years prior to the program implementation there were 48 rear end accidents at the three intersections (or 6.9 per year). In the seven years after the program implementation there were 52 (or 7.4 per year). When considering all accidents at all three intersections, Poway has experienced an overall 12% reduction in total accidents.

Cost of Program:

The cost of the red light photo enforcement program includes a fixed annual fee to Redflex and other costs such as a contract for a Community Services Officer in the Sheriff's Department, annual audits, and City staff time associated with numerous public records requests and program administration. With the 2010 contract, the fee to Redflex went down from \$322,220 per year to \$221,760 per year. Total annual program expenditures over the last five years (FY07/08 through FY11/12) have ranged from \$286,541 to \$392,770.

Program revenues come from citations issued (cost established by State) and a traffic safety fund administered by the Superior Court of California. Revenues have consistently exceeded program expenditures. Annual revenues have ranged from \$382,275 to \$611,582 for FY07/08 through FY11/12. Revenues are projected at \$381,065 for the current fiscal year. Considering all expenditures associated with the red light photo enforcement program, the revenues have fully paid for the program providing additional funds to the City for traffic safety improvements.

Since the revenues generated by the red light photo enforcement program exceed the cost of the program, the City has been able to pay for some projects that result in improved safety for drivers and/or pedestrians. Some of the projects funded or partially funded with this revenue are:

- Traffic calming at Painted Rock Elementary School
- Metate guard rail improvement
- Valle Verde traffic calming
- Pedestrian safety improvements at Twin Peaks and Espola Road intersection

Contract Termination:

The agreement with Redflex has a termination section that allows the City to terminate the contract for any reason at any time. There is no penalty fee to terminate the agreement because no new approaches were added since 2010. The City could end the program with a 30-day termination letter to Redflex. The cameras would cease operation at the specified date and Poway would only be responsible for payment of accrued services up to that point. To ensure motorist safety, the City would resume periodic monitoring at former photo-enforced intersections with traffic deputies.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the City Council provide direction to staff.

The March 5, 2013 memorandum on this subject discusses accident statistics at the three intersections where red light photo enforcement cameras are currently installed. The attachment to this Additional Materials Report is a table summary of the accident statistics for the three intersections for the seven years prior to and after the installation of the cameras.

Several years prior to the 2005 commencement of the current red light photo enforcement program, Poway had a similar program through a contract with U.S. Public Technologies, Inc. That program operated from 1996 through 1999 and provided camera units at five intersections:

- Poway Road and Community Road
- Poway Road and Pomerado Road
- Pomerado Road and Scripps Poway Parkway
- Twin Peaks Road and Pomerado Road
- Pomerado Road and Ted Williams Parkway

The contract with U.S. Public Technologies, Inc. expired on December 31, 1999 and was not extended.
